

Text of the Press Release on 12 May 1998

Comment by the Chief Cabinet Secretary on the Nuclear Tests by India

12 May 1998
Ministry of Foreign Affairs

1. In the afternoon of 11 May, the Indian Prime Minister, M. Atal Bihari Vajpayee, announced that India conducted underground nuclear tests. It is extremely regrettable that India conducted such tests, resisting the global trend to ban nuclear testing, while the international community, including Japan, has repeatedly requested the new Indian administration for maximum self-restraint on nuclear policies. Japan strongly urges the Indian Government to stop its development of nuclear weapons immediately. Further, Japan calls upon the countries concerned in the region to practice self-restraint in order not to let the Indian nuclear tests harm the stability of the region.
2. Today, Foreign Minister Keizo Obuchi will convey the above message to the Indian Ambassador in Tokyo. In New Delhi, in the afternoon of 11 May, Ambassador Hiroshi Hirabayashi conveyed the message to the Indian Government at a high level.
