Statement made by the Heads of State of the Commonwealth of Independent States on Maintaining Strategic Stability

The Heads of State of the Commonwealth of Independent States have considered the current situation regarding the maintenance of strategic stability in the world and the status of the international agreements on which it is based.

The Heads of States confirm their commitment to strengthening strategic stability and international security. They welcome ratification in Russia of START II, the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty and the 1997 package of agreements on anti-missile defence issues. They are counting on ratification of all these agreements in the United States of America.

The Heads of State note the historical significance of the Treaty on the Limitation of Anti-Ballistic Missile Systems of 26 May 1972 as a cornerstone of world peace, security and strategic stability, and confirm its continuing importance under present-day conditions. They are convinced that the ABM Treaty will continue to prove its worth for decades as the foundation of further strategic nuclear arms limitation in the world, an issue in which the world community is deeply interested.

The Heads of State consider that any measures eroding the aims and provisions of the ABM Treaty currently in force would have a negative impact on the security interests not only of the parties to this Treaty, but also of all members of the world community, and would undermine both global strategic stability and moves towards further limitation of strategic nuclear arms. The Heads of State support the policy of the international community to ensure the inviolability and integrity of the ABM Treaty, and call for additional efforts to preserve this Treaty by means of strict and full compliance with it so that it remains the basis of global strategic stability, international security and peace all over the world.
